I am writing to congratulate you on your school's outstanding achievement in the 2023 Phonics Screening Check.

We want to ensure every child develops a firm grasp of phonics as the basis on which to improve standards of reading. As such I was delighted to see your results.

With 96 per cent of pupils in Year 1 at Ide Hill Church of England Primary School meeting the expected standard in the check, your school is in the top 4 per cent of all primary schools in the country.

The latest figures show that 83 per cent of pupils who met the expected standard in the check went on to achieve at least the expected standard in reading at key stage 2 in 2023, which underlines the importance of developing the ability to decode words effectively at an early age.

Your particular success in teaching phonics and early reading so effectively means your pupils are developing a firm foundation, from which they can become increasingly fluent and develop a lifelong love of reading.

I would like to thank you for your commitment and success in this vital area of a child's early education and congratulate you, your staff and pupils again on all you have achieved.

Y6 visit to Bore Place

On Wednesday, Oaks visited Bore Place for the first of three visits this year. We were incredibly grateful to Bore Place who came to school to collect us and dropped us back in their amazing minibus.

When we arrived, we split into groups and learned about balanced diets and what one is comprised of. Afterwards, we learned about processed food and ultra-processed and the differences between them. We learned that processed food isn't always bad, for instance, if you roasted and blended a squash (

As we did for our flapjacks) then this would technically be processed. Ultra-processed foods tend to have preservatives and other additional things added.



After that, we went on a tour of the farm, seeing the wildlife that lives there as well as seeing where the vegetables are grown for their 'market garden'.

Once we had returned indoors, we followed the recipe carefully to make flapjacks containing squash that had been harvested previously at Bore Place. As they cooked, we ate our lunch and prepared for a journey to the milking parlour and to see the livestock that produces over 5000l of milk a day at Bore Place.



Inside the parlour, we were shown the equipment used to milk the cows and were even fortunate enough to meet three pregnant heifers (females) and a whole barn of calves.



To finish the day, we cut our cooled flapjacks and even got to eat them!

School Council

This week the children have been thinking about the six principles of nurture. Mrs Daniels talked to the children in celebration worship last week about the first principle so that they could have a good discussion when the children met for school council.

The theme this week was: **Children's Learning is understood developmentally.** In order to help children understand that learning is developmental we enlisted the support of year 6, who used the meeting to teach the children some origami. All children in KS1 made a lantern and children in KS2 made a butterfly. Initially they tried to make one on their own, without instructions. They were then shown how to make it, using step by step instructions. We used this experience to prompt some discussion about how we each learn differently.

The children said...

I found it tricky at the start but when I kept on trying, I did it!

I had to be patient with myself. It took me a bit longer to get right.

I was resilient and didn't give up

I learnt at a different speed to my friend. I was slower but we were both able to make it and we were both proud of what we had made.

Why is this important?

When we learn we build upon blocks of knowledge and skills that we have previously learnt. We do not all learn in the same way or at the same speed so even though our friends in the same class might be the same age as us, it does not mean that they are at the same stage as us in their learning. Why? Because learning is developmental. Mastering something isn't just a step, it's a whole staircase. Some of us might be standing on different steps, some might be at the bottom glancing up and some may have stumbled

midway, but we are all heading towards the same goal and we can all be successful.

The letters stand for the three Kings, Caspar, Melchior and Balthazar – or for the Latin blessing, Christus mansionem benedicat which means ‘May Christ bless this house’.
