Boudicca's husband, King Prasutagus, died. He secretly left his lands and money to the Romans in the hope that they would protect his tribe, the Iceni. Boudicca knew nothing of this.



However, the Romans went back on the agreement and took all the land for themselves. They took Boudicca's daughters back to Rome having flogged them in public.



Boudicca herself was publicly flogged by the Romans.



Boudicca was humiliated – she was so angry that she vowed to seek revenge on the Romans for taking away her people's freedom.



Boudicca went to the other Celtic tribes and persuaded them to unite against the invading might of Rome, something to be considered carefully. Eventually, they agreed to come together.



Boudicca and the other Celtic tribes took advantage of the Roman IX legion being in Wales fighting a rebellion and sacked and pillaged Camulodunum which was the Roman capital at the time (Colchester), Londinium and Verulamium (St Albans).



The Romans were swift to stop the rebellion and had experience all over Europe in doing so. They attacked the Celts at the Battle of Watling Street. The Celtic women and children had brought lots of wagons and carts to watch the fight from. When the Celts tried to flee, they had accidentally blocked their own retreat. The Romans spared nobody.



As the battle raged, Boudicca could see her army was losing. Despite having 100,000 men to the Romans' 10,000, the Celts suffered a heavy defeat. They could not compete against the well-armed, well-trained Roman legion. Boudicca fled the battle.





Rather than get captured by the Romans and suffer a far worse fate, historians believe that Boudicca poisoned herself.
