Pentecostal Pause Day

Last week Friday in church, the children had the chance to explore Pentecost (the church's birthday) through a number of reflective activities. They made friendship bracelets, found countries on a map, learnt how to say hello in a number of languages, helped build a Lego heart, watched their dreams and hopes blossom on a folded piece of paper in a pool and practiced the tricky art of waiting by watching sea creatures go up and down in a fish lamp. While doing all these activities the children were invited to reflect on the experiences of the disciples at Pentecost from waiting to travelling round the world to following Jesus' examples and teaching. They also were invited to think about how they would have felt and relate all this to their own lives. They thoroughly enjoyed themselves.



Collective Worship

In collective Worship we have been discussing relational well-being. We have been thinking about how we "love our neighbours as ourselves" looking at how we show kindness to our friends, family, local and global neighbours. We wondered how our kindness is reflected each day- who gets the best of us and who gets the rest? Our school vision is beautifully exemplified by the parable of the Good Samaritan. Nathan explained that "without a thought, without a word he just did what he needed to do and showed love to the injured man, taking care of him and even paying for somewhere for him to stay so that he was

safe". We thought about how we choose our friends, and the qualities that we look for. The children suggested qualities such as "Harry makes me laugh", "Bow inspires me" and "someone you can trust or who respects your point of view". Next week, we will be looking at the first Christians- how Jesus' friends spread his message.

We have been encouraging the children to share their talents with us in celebration worship. Most recently, Hannah has given a fantastic presentation about hatching ducklings and Rory showed his incredible self-taught skills on the piano, serenading us with a selection of songs.

News from Forest School

In the shelter of the trees the children have been busy - sawing, drilling, hammering and colouring to make Father's Day Treasures for Sunday.

We also make the most of the sunshine with some sponge tag games - which were great fun!

Last week was all about the delicate Elderflower and fire making. You might want to use some elder in your celebrations this weekend.

The children got the fire started and made some pancake batter.

Whilst we waited for the fire to heat, we learned about the special character of Elderflower and how to identify them from other flowers that look similar at this time of year. We are lucky enough to have an Elder bush in the field.

Some children chose to make Elderflower lemonade, Y5 were especially enthusiastic with this, before each got to cook their own pancake on the fire ~ finished with a dip into cinnamon sugar to make it extra tasty. The juice and the pancakes are both easy to make ~ your children now know how, so maybe enjoy some at home at the weekend.

A basic English Pancake recipe works well (we use Oat milk and Buckwheat flour to make them dairy and gluten free in schools) Dip the full flower head in the mix and fry on both sides.

For the juice it is simply 3 / 5 large heads of Elderflower, 1litre water, sugar to taste and one or two lemons, leave it for an hour or so giving it the occasional stir. The flowers and thin stalks are fine to eat. Do avoid the thicker stalks and stems.
